CAPITAL AND LABOR IN THE PHILADELPHIA TRANSIT INDUSTRY

ARMED STRIKEBREAKERS. WELFARE CAPITALISM. RACE-BAITING. SMEAR CAMPAIGNS. Transit workers in Philadelphia, New York City, and other cities across the United States faced numerous management strategies to control its workforce over nearly a century and they had to fight for their rights at every turn. Taking Philadelphia as a case study, James Wolfinger's Running the Rails explores the organizing campaigns, the battles to secure decent pay and safe working conditions, the victories and defeats of workers in one of the nation's most important, but understudied, industries. Given capital's great power in American society and management's enduring quest to control its workforce, it is remarkable to see what transit workers achieved.
