


2025 Events

Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive

Food Drive: Every 2nd Saturday in May, letter carriers across America collect the goodness & compassion of their postal customers, who participate in the NALC Stamp Out Hunger National Food Drive — the largest one-day food drive in the nation. Led by the National Association of Letter Carriers (AFL-CIO), with help from rural letter carriers, other postal employees & other volunteers, carriers collect non-perishable food donations left by mailboxes and in post offices and deliver them to local community food banks, pantries and shelters. To donate, just place a box or can of nonperishable food next to your mailbox before your letter carrier delivers mail on the second Saturday in May. The carrier will do the rest.
