


Completion of the Erie Canal in 1825 was a monumental achievement, linking the Great Lakes to the Atlantic Ocean. It transformed NYC into a hub of international trade, drove the rise of industrial cities like Rochester & accelerated westward expansion. The Erie Canal turns 200 years old October 26. Dozens of events state-wide celebrate the canal -- and the prodigious effort of the workers who dug it.

2025 Alice Cook - Lois Gray Distinguished Lecture: Annelise Orleck, Prof. of History, Co-Chair, Women's, Gender & Sexuality Studies at Dartmouth College. In 2010, low-wage workers in service, retail, garment & farm work began organizing global labor actions of unprecedented scale involving workers on 6 continents. 



Para Power: Education, Civil Rights, and the Forgotten Jobs Program of the War on Poverty

Webinar: Paraprofessionals entered American schools during the "crisis of care" in the late 1960s. Despite low pay and second-rate status, they often greatly improved systems of public education. In his new book, *Para Power: How Paraprofessional Labor Changed Education*, Nick Juravich (Asst. Prof. of History & Labor Studies, UMass Boston) details how this 1st generation of paras transformed NYC schools & relationships with the communities they served. Paraprofessionals created 100s of 1000s of jobs in working-class Black & Latino neighborhoods, funded by the Economic Opportunity Act (or "War on Poverty"), a pipeline for Black & Latino teachers in the 1970s & early 1980s, whose organizing helped drive the integration & expansion of public sector unions.
